### ***Short background and CV***

I have a degree in theology from the University of Tilburg; Bachelor and Master (1987) and I received my PhD in theology from the University of Tilburg in 1999.

After my graduation, I started my professional career as a religious education teacher in secondary education (1987 – 1988). Next I became a PhD-student and worked for four years on a research project concerning theodicy and religious education (1988 – 1992). The project involved the design and empirical testing of a religious education curriculum on the problem of evil for secondary education. Subsequently, I worked for seven years in the Dutch army as a chaplain (1992 – 1999). I was specifically occupied with the moral, and partly also, the religious education of Dutch soldiers as they prepared for foreign missions. In the meantime I

finished my dissertation and after I received my PhD I was appointed as an assistant professor at the Radboud University (1999 – present). This is still my current position. As an assistant professor at the Faculty of Philosophy, Theology and Religious Studies I teach courses in the religious studies programme on: sociology of religion, pedagogy of religion and academic skills. As an assistant professor at the Institute for Teacher Training I teach courses on the didactics of RE.

### ***Research interests and research fields***

In the Netherlands RE is a confessional subject and is only part of the curriculum in religiously affiliated schools. But since most schools in the Netherlands are religiously affiliated schools, RE is widespread in the Dutch educational system. On the other hand, secularization is also widespread in the Netherlands and the Dutch student population is becoming increasingly secular. Many religiously affiliated schools, therefore, are populated by a growing number of students with no religious background whatsoever. This situation has resulted in three major research interests: reflecting on the legitimacy of RE in school from a secular, pedagogical perspective (1), considering the (religious) worldviews of Dutch youths (2) and studying processes of intergenerational, religious transmission in the family in order to come to a deeper understanding (one) of the causes of the ongoing process of secularization in the Netherlands (3). My research fields thus regard RE in school as well as religious socialization in the family and I conduct theoretical as well as empirical studies.

### ***Current projects***

As from 2007 I conducted a longitudinal, panel study into the effects of a religious upbringing on religious commitment later in life. This study has resulted in the publication of six articles and a final, seventh, article is forthcoming. At the moment I am preparing a follow-up study into the possible effects of a religious upbringing on pro-social behaviour, i.e. volunteering and philanthropy, later in life.
